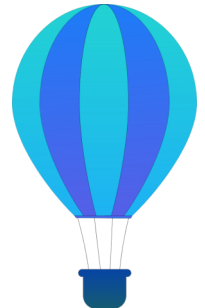
Thanks to the community of Savage for helping make this trip possible. It was an incredible experience, and one we will never forget!

It's All Business in New Computer Lab

It's hard to believe the new Computer Lab was installed six months ago! The students, however, have adapted beautifully to the new technology – new operating systems, new software, new challenges. I thought it might be helpful to give everyone some information about each class's progress in Keyboarding, as well as a few projects our students have completed.

Grades 1 & 2: Our primary students are learning to Keyboard using the "big" computers in the lab. The focus has been on technique, as they prepare for skills advancement next year.

Grade 3: This class is now typing by touch and there have been several opportunities to complete classroom projects using Google Docs and Slides. From story writing to formatting cover pages and anagrams.

Grades 4, 5 & 6: Since most students are becoming familiar with Google Apps in their classrooms, their time in the Computer Lab is spent increasing their accuracy and speed in keyboarding in preparation for their upper grade expectations. A highlight of their year was participating in "An

Hour of Code" when they joined millions of students across the country and across the world by diving into Computer Programming, for which they received a Certificate of Participation. Additionally, all students in the middle grades received training through the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children's program on Computer Safety.

Grades 7 & 8: Our Computer Skills class has been busily working on becoming Google Apps experts, as well as exploring new online programs to facilitate their learning in other classes. Projects have ranged from working in Word Processing and Spreadsheet applications to Presentation, Timeline, Drawing and other programs. Several times they engaged in cross-curricular work with other teachers, lending a touch of realism to varied projects. Students in the Middle School received a broader look at computer safety including extensive training on Digital Citizenship, Social Media use and online exploration.

Grade 9: The Computer Applications students eagerly learned the school's new technology and have been completing a diverse curriculum including Google Apps, Computer Pro-

gramming, and Specialty Programs such as Powtoons, Timeline Maker and art-related programs

Accounting/Business Math: The two 10th grade students in this class are now confident in their basic, double-entry Bookkeeping/Accounting by taking on the role of business owners, learning the importance of accounting skills for the successful operation of a business. In the Second Semester, students gained knowledge of Personal Finance and were able to see the "world of finance" from their own perspectives.

Entrepreneurship/Intro to Business & Business Law: Wow! This class of rocked it when they were challenged to develop a viable business last fall. Two groups of students actually created businesses, both of which turned a handsome profit for their owners

In the Second Semester, students were introduced to investing – an important skill for the business owners in the class.

All in all, it's been a busy year with many exciting changes – and you can expect your student to learn and apply greater computer-related challenges as he/she moves up to a higher grade!
